## Movements that use Manipulatives - Remember that

- 1.) you will need to set boundaries for the children when they hold anything in their hands. My rule is that you have to use the object "appropriately" or they will not be able to join us in the activity (I take the object). Remember also that
- 2.) you will have a tiny bit of chaos and excitement as you pass things out and take things back in. Fortunately the children will have an attitude of excitement as they learn, especially if you can minimize the chaos by using the teachers, counselors, or your accompanist to help you pass things out or take things in.
